• MAPS Program is a multidisciplinary program for specific are studies – the Asia- Pacific Region- with specific focus on international economics, international relations, and international law.

MAPS is the first international program offered in Thailand that provides excellent opportunities for students to explore the Asia-Pacific Region and connect students with other international students and experts in fields related to the Asia-Pacific region.

Admission Criteria

> A Bachelor's Degree in any field with a cumulative GPA of 2.5 and above from an accredited university.

Minimum requirement for English Proficiency is 6.5 for IELTS, 550 for paper based TOEFL test, 79 for internet-based TOEFL test, and 213 for computer-based TOEFL test or 550 for TU-GET (valid if taken less than 2 years).

An academic essay of approximately 500 words.

Scholarships are available upon request. Terms and Conditions may apply.

> The program lasts 18 months (three semesters and one summer semester), full-time, and requires the completion of 39 credits.

ASIA PACIFIC RESOURCE CENTER

MAPS Common Room, located at the 1st floor of the Social Science Complex next to the Asia-Pacific Resource Center, is designed specially for MAPS graduate students. The MAPS Common Room is created in order to provide a comfortable atmosphere and welcoming environment. It also features a reliable wireless Internet access and lockers for student use.

RUSSIAN & CIS STUDIES CENTRE

The Russian & CIS Studies Centre, located next to the MAPS Common Room is a multifunction hall that serves as a classroom, study and research area. It features a long table where meetings can be held and a 20-seater room with a state of the art projector. This room also has its own computer lab which is specifically used in learning the Russian language.

APS 600 Foundation Asia-Pacific Studies

This course introduces key concepts from the main disciplines of the program. The course will be divided into three parts: international economics, international relations, and international law. International economics includes trade theories and policies, regional trade agreements, labor and capital movement, and international finance. International relations covers the main concepts, ideas, and analytical tools necessary to understand the relationships among countries, major concerns, issues, and players in world politics. Lastly, international law covers the essential concepts of international law and institutions, including the sources of international law, the use of force, international human rights, international business transactions, and international economic law. Various case studies of issues in international economics, international relations among China, USA, ASEAN, North Korea, South Korea, and Convention on the territorial Sea and the Contiguous Zone, etc.

APS 612 Dynamism of the Thai Economy

This course studies on the development of Thailand economic structure and its impacts on Thailand economy. The course will also study on the impacts of structural changes and role of Thai state on economic growth, economic stability, and economic equity.

APS 621 Political, Security, and Defense Strategies in the Asia-Pacific Region

The course gives an overview and challenges in the international security, defence strategy and security policy with respect to Asia-Pacific region. The Asia-Pacific region is experiencing a shift in the balance of power and also being challenged by a various non-traditional security issues. The course will look at the key players in the region, including the two superpowers- the US and China and middle powers such as Australia, Indonesia, Japan, and Republic of Korea would also be considered. Other issues discussed include military and political cooperation in the region, and the roles and objectives of ASEAN. Lastly, non-traditional security issues – including irregular migration, drug tracking, terrorism, and natural disaster will be discussed as well.

APS 623 International Relations and Foreign Policy in the Asia-Pacific Region

The course will introduce students to the international relations of the Asia-Pacific region with regards to foreign policy. It will also examine how different countries in the Asia-Pacific region conduct foreign policy decisions on different issues, such as trade, aid, military intervention, global environment, and so forth. In the first part, the course examines IR theory and the Asia-Pacific region. In the second part, the course examines the level of analysis and the formation of foreign policy and evaluates the processes by which foreign policy are made.

APS 800 Thesis

The thesis course provides an opportunity for students to conduct research in their own area of interest. Topics can be selected from five areas: Japan and Republic of Korea, PRC and Taiwan, Australia and New Zealand, ASEAN/Southeast Asian Studies, and Telecommunication Policy and Development in the Asia-Pacific region. The thesis course will involve close collaboration between supervisor and student. Students are expected to present weekly progress in the workshop sessions organized by the program.



Exchange Program to Japan

Two students from the second batch of MAPS had the opportunity to visit the Land of the Rising Sun for an exchange program at Yokohama City University (YCU). Miss Kornchanok Nushkasem (Mook) and Mr. Chayapruek Kongchan (Gunz) spent six months of their final semester overseas. Here is what Mook has to say about this academic venture.







"While in abroad, I studied three courses including Global Service Management, Global Leadership and elementary Japanese. As an exchange student, it was fascinating to experience Japan's tertiary education. I was able to observe that the Japanese teaching styles and classroom environment were somewhat different from MAPS. At YCU, lecturers were less focused on theoretical frameworks and more on applying methods through case studies. Interestingly, the level of workloads and assignments were relatively lower than I expected. My advice for the future exchange students of MAPS is to prepare and practice some basic critical thinking skills as this will make their study in Japan much easier. Apart from that, confidence and welladaptation skills are very useful given that most Japanese students are shy and quiet, especially those who have difficulty with the English language. The most challenging part in Japan was the language barrier. Luckily, all lecturers and office staff at the university were highly interactive and supportive for all us students which makes my stay there more secured. Nevertheless, aside from the academic aspect, the entire exchange program gave me an opportunity to experience a new culture and meet new friends which I will take back with me to Thailand."

This year's three-day international conference took place in the beautiful province of Chiang Rai, Thailand, from December 6 to 8, 2017 bearing the theme: "Asia Pacific: World's New Focal Point." Academicians and scholars with various expertise on Area Studies in the Asia Pacific region are flown into the cool north to heat up the discussion through an anticipated healthy exchanges of ideas and perspectives about this dynamic part of the world. Waseda University of Japan, Moscow State Institute of International Relations (MGIMO) of Russia, Copenhagen Business School of Denmark, and the United Kingdom's SOAS University of London are just among some of the participating universities present at the event.

This part has truly served its purpose in opening up the opportunity for experts, professors, and students to converge in a friendly discussion before the actual presentations in the next two days. TU-CAPS 2017

December 7 – Greeted by the North's fresh morning air, the participants left their room for a bountiful breakfast before proceeding to the Doi Toung Room for the actual program proper. At exactly 9:00 AM, the program was officially opened by the Director of Thammasat Institute of Area Studies (TIARA) and MAPS, Asst. Prof. Dr. Suphat Suphachalasai through his welcoming speech. It was then followed by a keynote speech given by Prof. William T. Tow of the Coral Bell School of Asia Pacific Affairs, ANU College of Asia & the Pacific, Australian National University which mainly enumerated the various challenges and issues faced by this region.





The opening session of TU-CAPS was dedicated to the security issues in the Asia-Pacific Region. The first speaker Dr. Victor Sumsky, the Director of MGIMO's ASEAN Center gave a presentation entitled: "Security Situation in the Asia-Pacific: Moscow's Perspective." Continuing on with a Russian themed presentation was Thammasat University's Asst.Prof. Jittipat Poonkham' "Russia's Pivot to Asia: Visionary or Reactionary?" Dr. Enze Han of SOAS presented about "External Threats, Internal Challenges, and State Building in East Asia," followed by Dr. Takashi Tsukamoto of Thammasat University's "Imagining an Unimaginable Dream: Disputes, Dialogue and Security Community Building in Southeast Asia." Capping off the session was an interesting presentation entitled "Rule of Law or Rule by Lawyers: Legal Ordering and Development" by Asst. Prof. Dr. Maj Lervad Gasten from the Department of Business and Politics, Copenhagen Business School. Asst. Prof. Dr. Wasan Luangprapat, Faculty of Political Science, Thammasat University served as the Chair for this session. In the afternoon, the TU-CAPS was divided into two simultaneous sessions, one which continued on with topics and issues regarding Asia-Pacific Studies and the other which was solely dedicated to Telecommunication and ICT Development Policy in the Asia-Pacific Region.

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ACTION PLAN AND WAY FORWARD 2018

In 2018, MAPS will welcome our fourth batch from universities around ASEAN and Asia Pacific. This coming year the program aspires to provide more scholarships for our prospective students coming from ASEAN who have outstanding academic performance, desire for research and leadership skills. In addition, MAPS will also open for application for prospective students who are interested in enhancing their knowledge in Asia-Pacific studies in the hopes of becoming an area studies expert. It is also most likely that the program will venture into more exchange programs with our partner universities in Japan after the success this year. At the same time, we hope that we will be able this 2018 not only to send out students for exchange but also to accept inbound students from other universities to have an experience of the quality education the program renders.

This coming December, the MAPS also plans to conduct its third Thammasat Annual Academic and Post Graduate International Conference, this time somewhere in the south. The 3-day international conference will welcome scholars in the field of Asia-Pacific studies, public policies, international relations, political sciences, economics, laws, and telecommunication policy. Our third batch (intake 2017) will have the opportunity to present their studies in this international academic platform with the chance to be scrutinized by the renowned scholars in the fields which would be coming from distinguished faculties from universities of Japan, South Korea, Australia, Europe, United States, and ASEAN. The outcomes of the first and second TU-CAPS will be published as both individual working paper and proceeding in the first half of 2018. Moreover, the program will revamp its academic tools such as the Thesis Writing Guidebook which is essential for our students as it will serve as a guidebook them for their studies as they venture into research. Publications to promote MAPS program will also underway in order to spread the information related to the programs.

In terms of academic events, MAPS program plan to bring more renowned scholars in the field concerning the Asia-Pacific region. 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
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






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
